Ema Datshi, the delicacy of Bhutan

If you ever happen to visit Bhutan, you can't afford to forget to taste Ema Datshi. It is a popular dish especially among the Bhutanese people and most people cook it at home almost everyday. As hotels and restaurants also cook this dish, it has earned popularity among the tourists as well today.

Ema Datshi is a curry. It is spicy and not meant to be eaten just as a curry alone. Ema Datshi in dzongkha translates in English as chili cheese and usually eaten along with rice. Ema means chili and Datshi means



cheese. It was named this way because chili and cheese are the main ingredients of this delicacy. Onions and tomatoes are some of the other ingredients. The curry actually is spicy but people add other spices to make it less spicy today.

Ema Datshi is cooked out of different types of chilies, the Bhutanese big chilies, dried chilies and Indian chillies. Indian chillies are usually spicier than the Bhutanese chillies. Any dinner, lunch, breakfast doesn't go without Ema Datshi for most of the time. It is not for the people suffering from ulcers and who cant eat spicy foods.

Tenzin Jamtsho, a Bhutanese student who is studying communication arts here in Rangsit University said that Ema Datshi is one delicacy of Bhutan and no foreign visitors return without trying it. Ema Dastshi is always there in the menu in the hotels and at homes as well.

Tenzin is a cook who can prepare so many Bhutanese dishes and Ema Datshi is one of them. He usually cooks at home for his family and also during the special occasions. He said Ema Datshi is cooked in two ways, gravy and the other bit dry. "Bhutanese like spicy foods and they cant miss Ema Datshi from their menu almost all their meals," he said.

He said to cook Ema Datshi does not require special lessons and it is done in a traditional way of cooking which is very easy. "Our parents have been cooking this for ages and we do the same way today," he said.

This cuisine is valued most when the country gets the first harvest of our own chilles for the year. People living in the cities buy chilles from the markets and cook at home for the family.

Tenzin Jamtsho said he always cooked during the food competitions in university but could not cook Ema Datshi even once. "This is because we don't get Bhutanese chilies here and the small chilies that we get here are too spicy," he said he would cook for some occasions in the university in the future if he could get some Bhutanese chilies.

RIC HEALTH SURVEY

How RIC students live with their Health?



Near 50 percent of those students have an annual health check, the other 30 percent have their health checked once every 2 years, and the remaining 20 percent students do it once more than 3 years.

RIC students spend a lot of money on their health support. 35 percent of them spend more than 500 Baht per month, 45 percent students spend more than 200 and 20 percent spend less than 200 baht monthly.

Most RIC students have diarrhea as their biggest health problem in a year, close to 85 percent shown in the questionnaire as a big difference compared to the second one – cold and fever (15 percent). And most of the students who participated in the survey don't have just one allergy.

Breakfasts are considered less important at Rangsit University International College. Almost 50 percent of RIC students answered they have breakfast less than 2 times a week on the questionnaire. 25 percent said more than 3 times per week. There are only near 25 percent of them said they have breakfast every day. About food choices, almost all of them like to have Asian food, especially rice for lunch. Only a few students choose American fast food and others.

Overall, RIC students are living well without a lot of health risks. They all have insurance coverage which provides them with free health care. Those students are taking care of their health seriously since they do have health checks regularly. There is one condition according to this survey that might lead to some health problems in the future because there is a large number of students who don't have breakfast often. There is much research showing that having good breakfast can actually reduce the chance for humans to get nutrition and hearing problems. So, RIC students should be encouraged to have breakfasts regularly.
